


## Infant Mortality Rates




## NEW JERSEY NEONATAL AND INFANT MORTALITY, 2006-2015



## Racial Disparities


### New Jersey Infant Mortality Rates by Race, 2006-2015



New Jersey ranks #8 in the nation for lowest infant mortality rates (CDC Wonder); however, the racial gap in infant mortality is one of the highest in the nation, ranking as #5 highest disparity (CDC Wonder). African American women experience an infant mortality rate that is nearly 3 times that of their white counterparts.

## Causes of Death


The leading causes of death for white infants are SIDS (16.1%) and congenital anomalies (15.3%). For African American infants, the leading causes of death are preterm/low birthweight (20.4%) and congenital anomalies (8.8%). Moreover, for African American infants, those born premature are 2.8 times more likely to die than their white counterparts (NJ SHAD).





### Infant Mortality Rates by Race: 2000-2015



Nearly 125 infants in Central New Jersey die before their first birthday. Of those, 72% are neonates (less than 28 days after birth). African American women are at dramatically greater risk of experiencing the death of an infant than their white counterparts, such that African American infants die at more than 4 times the rate of white infants (NJ SHAD).
